#### Synopsis:

While searching for it, Nikola has to face difficult questions about his own life.

## **Director Biography:**

Pavel G. Vesnakov graduated from the New Bulgarian University in 2011 as a Bachelor of Visual Arts and Film Directing. He is one of the most successful young Bulgarian film directors, known for his provocative ideas and deeply realistic films that explore the degradation of modern Bulgarian society and the relationships between people. He is the screenwriter and director of the short film trilogy Inches of Suburbia. It consists of three films: Trains (2011), The Paraffin Prince (2012) and **Pride** (2013). The parts of the trilogy have been shown at a number of international film festivals such as the ISFF Clermont Ferrand, the IFF Locarno, Sarajevo IFF, ASIANA ISFF and many others. He has been awarded with more than 30 prestigious awards, including the Grand Prix for Best Film at the Clermont Ferrand Festival in France 2014 and Nomination for European Film Awards 2014. In 2015, with his latest short film project, Zeus, Pavel won the Robert Bosch Foundation's grand prize for co-production with Eastern Europe. Pavel has also participated in both Berlinale and Sarajevo Talents.

#### **Director Statement:**

The main character – Nikola is a representative of a generation which has not had the chance of living normally in Bulgaria. Finished his education at the end of the 80's, Nikola embodies an obsolete set of morals. It consists of the unwavering pragmatism of Communism and the enormous and sometimes naïve positivity of Democracy. This is a set of morals which arose in a critical and divisive moment for Bulgaria the transition between Communism and Democracy. At the beginning of this transition, Nikola's generation lived with the idea that everything will get better. Gradually, this hope faded away and his generation's representatives emigrated, leaving Bulgarian society with an impossible task – to tackle corruption, aggression and apathy of a people living in a failing and agonizing state. I believe my main character's story is important from a contemporary point of view, because deep inside him, there flickers the forgotten flame to rebel and to make self-sacrifice if need be.
